


INTERGENERATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL - SEPT. 4th, 9:15am

GRANDPARENTS DAY - SEPT. 11th

Since we've already had Rally Day and "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday has been pushed into the future, we are able to actually celebrate a day that is on the calendar but gets overlooked – GRANDPARENT'S DAY!! I bet many of you didn't know there was a National Grandparent's Day. The inspiration for a National Grandparents Day originated with Marian McQuade, a housewife in West Virginia. Her primary motivation was to champion the cause of lonely elderly in nursing homes. She also hoped to persuade grandchildren to tap the wisdom and heritage their grandparents could provide. President Jimmy Carter, in 1978, proclaimed that National Grandparents Day would be celebrated every year on the first Sunday after Labor Day. Therefore, on September 11th, we will celebrate those of you who are grandparents and those who act like grandparents (in nurturing others and if you spoil them, that's okay too). We will have a special blessing in both worship services and a presentation during the Second Sunday Breakfast that day.

Don't worry if your grandchildren or your grandparents aren't here that day. We'll have surrogates for all those roles.

Last week, I had around 250 unread emails in my inbox. 98% of these are from different blogs to which I subscribe. I hadn't had (or taken) the time to read them for over two years. I still have a lot of them unread, but I perused some and also looked at some others that I have saved to share. So this month, I want to share an article from one that I read (from Huffington Post). The story is entitled "Dear Parents with Young Children in Church" by Jamie Bruesehoff. While the article is geared to parents of young children, it is a good reminder for everyone what church is about and why we gather together for worship. (The words in **bold** are my emphasis.)

"Dear Parents with Young Children in Church, You are doing something really, *really* important. I know it's not easy. I see you with your arms overflowing, and I know you came to church already tired. Parenting is tiring. Really tiring.

I watch you bounce and sway trying to keep the baby quiet, juggling the infant car seat and the diaper bag as you find a seat. I see you wince as your child cries. I see you anxiously pull things out of your bag of tricks to try to quiet them.

And I see you with your toddler and your preschooler. I watch you cringe when your little girl asks an innocent question in a voice that might not be an inside voice let alone a church whisper. I hear the exasperation in your voice as you *beg* your child to just sit, to be quiet as you feel everyone's eyes on you. Not everyone is looking, but I know it feels that way.

I know you're wondering, is this worth it? Why do I bother? I know you often leave church more exhausted than fulfilled. But **what you are doing is so important.**

When you are here, the church is filled with a joyful noise. When you are here, the Body of Christ is more fully present. When you are here, we are reminded that this worship thing we do isn't about bible study or personal, quiet contemplation but coming together to worship as a community where all are welcome, where we share in the Word and Sacrament together. When you are here, I have hope that these pews won't be empty in 10 years when you may think your kids are old enough to *sit quietly and behave in worship*. I know that they are learning how and why we worship now, before it's too late. They are learning that worship is important.

I see them learning. In the midst of the cries, whines, and giggles, in the midst of the crinkling of pretzel bags and the growing pile of crumbs, I see a little girl who insists on going two pews up to share peace with someone she's never met. I hear a little boy slurping every last drop of his communion wine out of the cup, determined not to miss a drop of Jesus. I watch a child excitedly color a cross and point to the one in the front of the sanctuary. I hear the echos of "Amens" just a few seconds after the rest of the community says it together. I watch a boy just learning to read try to sound out the words in the worship book or count his way to Hymn 672. Even on weeks when I can't see my own children learning because, well, it's one of *those* mornings, I can see your children learning.

I know how hard it is to do what you're doing, but I want you to know *it matters*. It matters to me. It matters to my children to not be alone in the pew. It matters to the congregation to know that families care about faith, to see young people... and even on those weeks when you can't see the little moments, it matters to your children.

It matters that they learn that **worship is what we do as a community of faith**, that **everyone is welcome**, that **their worship matters**. When we teach children that their worship matters, we teach them that they are *enough* right here and right now as members of the church community. They don't need to wait until they can believe, pray or worship a certain way to be welcome here, and I know adults who are still looking to be shown that. **It matters that children learn that they are an integral part of this church, that their prayers, their songs, and even their badly (or perfectly-timed, depending on who you ask) cries and whines are a joyful noise because it means they are present.**

I know it's hard, but **thank you** for what you do when you bring your children to church. Please know that your family -- with all of its noise, struggle, commotion, and joy -- are not simply tolerated (as you may be thinking), **you are a vital part of the community gathered in worship.**"



Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Thank you! With your support our sanctuary will soon have a beautiful piano to support our worship services. An instrument doesn't "make or break" our worship service, but it can add or detract from it. I'm looking forward to this new addition.



The council didn't meet in June, but our July council meeting made up for it. We discussed, at great length, the proposal from our musical leaders to purchase the baby grand piano. We also discussed the need to start working on the budget for 2017 and will discuss it in much more detail in August and September. God's Work – Our Hands will be at a later date; plans are still being made so stay tuned! Previously we had tabled the idea of having a fall fest type of event the day of the upcoming Polka Service. July's discussion brought that idea to a close; there won't be a festival, but there will be a sausage supper. We also discussed the use of CTK facilities by various groups. We had received a few complaints about groups disturbing another's meeting. We do understand how frustrating it is to have a meeting interrupted and how embarrassing it is when you enter a room at the wrong time. At the end, we agreed that we must do a better job when scheduling the groups using our facilities and to encourage all of the groups to join us in our vision of welcoming all.

Personally, that discussion reminded me that I can't control everyone's thoughts and actions. I can't keep "John" from doing this or "Jane" from doing that. I can't keep "Tom" or "Tina" from getting mad when "John" or "Jane" do what they want. I can't truly understand why they do what they do or feel what they feel. I can't get them to do what I want them to do or feel the way I want them to. All I can control is how I respond to their actions and reactions. So as the world moves on around me with "John" and "Jane" doing what they want and "Tom" and "Tina" reacting how they do, I know I can't do anything about it. Well, nothing that is, but control how I respond. Am I perfect in my responses all the time? Of course not. I am human just like each of you.

To borrow from Charles Swindoll, Strengthening Your Grip, "Attitude is more important than the past, than education, than money, than circumstances, than what people do or say. It is more important than appearance, giftedness, or skill. The remarkable thing is, we have a choice everyday regarding the attitude we will embrace for that day. We cannot change our past. We cannot change the fact that people act in a certain way. We cannot change the inevitable. The only thing we can do is play on the one string we have, and that is our attitude."

Please keep our children, their teachers, our congregation, and our country in your prayers!

WORSHIP FYI

Beginning on September 4, we will return to the practice of wearing robes during worship. We will also resume using the Apostles' Creed. During the summer, we used a different Statement of Faith to help us see the good in something that is new and different, but still just as valid in professing what we believe. Another benefit from this change is that it helps us remember the beauty (and the meanings found therein) in the traditional creeds that have been used for centuries. When we use something repeatedly, there is a chance for it to become rote and we don't always focus on the meaning of what we are saying. Remember, Martin Luther said the only "necessary" components of worship are the Word (meaning the scripture readings and the proclamation of the Good News) and the sacraments. According to Luther, everything else is able to be changed, but don't fret. We won't be making any wild changes anytime soon.

OUR CHOIR will begin weekly Wednesday rehearsals on September 7 from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. You may enter the church building thru the door located closest to the choir room.

Stewardship Report—September, 2016

***"Not what we give but what we share,
For the gift without the giver is bare,
He who gives of himself feeds three,
Himself, his hungering neighbor, and Me".***

These lines, from a poem written by James Russell Lowell titled "*The Vision of Sir Launfal*", were sent to me by Alma Geyer. She suggested that we consider them as a basis for our newsletter article. I agree.

We believe that each of us is a steward, and as stated in God's Word, we have an obligation to share what we have with others. When we talk about stewardship, we usually think, incorrectly, about sharing our financial resources. However, we must also consider our commitment to sharing things other than our financial resources. As is clearly stated in the lines above, the emphasis is on **sharing**, and more specifically on **feeding**.

Let's talk for a moment about feeding others. I recently came across an article that included the statement "The world's hunger is getting ridiculous. There is more fruit in a rich man's shampoo than in a poor man's plate". Also, you will recall that in our June message, Leonard stated that 40% of the food in this country is never consumed; and in New York City, enough food is wasted in one month that would feed a third world country for a year. This is tragic.

How should we respond? We should **share**. There are over 25 passages in scripture that talk about feeding the hungry. Proverbs 22:9 says that "A generous person will be blessed, for he gives some of his food to the poor".

How do we feed the hungry? On the local level we support RACAP, both as a congregation and as individuals. Others also support organizations such as the San Antonio Food Bank, Meals on Wheels, United Way, and many others. On a larger scale we support the ELCA's global commitment to reduce to world hunger.

Let us remember that God tells us that "He blesses us so we can help others".

Again, our thanks to Alma for suggesting we consider the lines from this poem as a basis for this month's article.
