VIRTUAL GATHERINGS

One of the hardest parts of this "Stay at home" order, is the loneliness and lack of connection people may be feeling. In an attempt to stay connected, we are offering a number of different opportunities to interact with others. Unfortunately, all of them are VIRTUAL (meaning they will take place using the internet and/or smart phones). **See page two for more details.** None of these have any agenda other than offering a time when anyone who wishes to do so can visit with others. This is simply meant to be a time when people can interact with each other.

If you haven't already seen them, the staff and other leaders are offering brief daily devotions, thoughts and children's messages on the church Facebook page and on our NEW YouTube channel (ChristtheKing Lutheran Church). Go check them out.

Members of church council are reaching out to every church member via the telephone to help touch base because we also realize that not everyone has internet capabilities. Please feel free to call people on your own to help everyone feel connected.

VIRTUAL GATHERINGS - **cont'd**

Office Hours will be a time when anyone can stop in (log in to the zoom meeting) and simply visit with whoever is the host (see chart below). Think of it as an Open House kind of thing where you can come and go. If none of the times below work for you and you'd like to meet with one of us, you can always call and set up an appointment.

Coffee Hour (or TEA) is just like having coffee or tea at church before or between worship services on Sunday. Whoever is there can visit with each other. Again, it is a come and go situation scheduled for every Tuesday morning from 9-10am. Grab your favorite cup of coffee or tea and join the conversation.

Happy Hour is another opportunity to visit with whomever else is online at the same time. It is also a come and go situation, scheduled for every Thursday evening at 6pm. You can have your own beer, wine, cocktail or glass of water and see who shows up for a connection.

If you are trying to join the meeting using your smart phone (and you want video/audio; rather than just calling in like a regular telephone call), you can download the Zoom Cloud Meetings app. Using this option, you will also need to set up a free account with your email address.

THANKS to everyone for your understanding and patience as we delve into many new areas and ways of being the church together!



Wow! What a change these past few weeks have brought! It is definitely a lesson in how quickly life can change for ALL of us. On one of my online devotional thoughts, I mentioned that we know the Kingdoms of Israel and Judah were both sent into exile. Exile is defined as the state of being barred from one's native country. While our situation is nothing like the Jewish exile, even so we can say that in a sense, we have all been exiled. We are being forced out of the natural rhythms of our lives and we have been barred from gathering with others as we would like. Even so, we are still the

church! We continue to encourage each other and lift one another up in prayer and to stay connected via the telephone and post office.

Additionally, as a reminder, our Lenten theme has been the Wholeness Wheel. We've been talking about different ways to stay healthy and balancing the different areas of our lives. Even as we are quarantined, finding balance and staying healthy in all areas is important. Dinah Ryson posted a meme on her Facebook page that offered these questions to ask yourself daily during the quarantine.

1. Who am I checking on or connecting with today?
2. What expectations of "normal" am I letting go of today?
3. How am I getting outside today?
4. How am I moving my body today?
5. How am I expressing my creativity today?
6. What type of self-care am I practicing today?
7. What am I grateful for today?

Even in our isolation, we can find things for which to be grateful. In fact this is an important practice especially when things seem so discouraging. One of the books I am reading is called "Love Warrior" by Glennon Doyle. Therein, she tells the story of a personal crisis. She realizes something significant about her crisis that related to the word disaster. She remembered that it comes from the word "astro" meaning stars and "dis" meaning without, so "without stars". She goes on to say that in her crisis, that "it would only be a disaster if she lost all awareness of the light". This speaks to us beautifully as we find ourselves separated from one another. We, who are Christians, proclaim Jesus as the Light of the World. This situation in which we find ourselves is not a disaster. It is only a disaster if we cannot find the light. But if we keep our focus on Christ as the Light of the World, then we can get through this.

I encourage you to look for the moments within you day where the Light of Christ has shone brightly. Reflect on your day and find where God was present. If you are willing, I'd then encourage you to post a video of yourself sharing this revelation on the church's Facebook page to share with everyone.

CROSSES ON THE LAWN (or your DOOR)



While we probably can't gather for Holy Week and Easter, we can still observe these important moments in our faith lives and share the story with those people who live around us or happen to drive by.

Before Sunday, April 5th

Everyone is invited to make some sort of plain cross and place it in your front yard or on a balcony, or the door of your apartment. For those in the yards, the bigger they are, the better and obviously, they should be made to withstand the weather.

If you would like to participate and don't have the means to make a cross, contact the church office and we'll do our best to find someone who could make one for you. (If you are someone who is willing to make a cross out of wood for someone else, please let us know that too!)



On Saturday, April 4th

Place some palm branches or leafy plants around your cross to remember Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem.



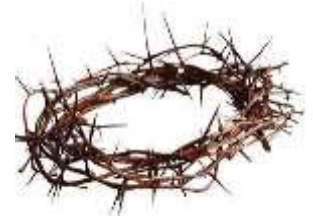
On the night before Thursday, April 9th (Maundy Thursday)

Place water pitchers, towels and a big heart near and on your cross. This is the day Jesus washes his disciples' feet before they have the Last Supper. He tells them "Love one another as I have loved you."



On the morning of Friday, April 10th (Good Friday)

Remove the other items. Take a crown of thorns which you have made and place it on the cross. Google for ideas or just draw one that can be added.



At the end of the day (in the evening), take the crown off and let your cross be empty as we know Christ was laid in the tomb.

STEWARDSHIP OF SELF: USE MY INTELLECT

FOCUS! That word is the central part of using My Intellect. During this COVID-19 National Emergency phase of American history, we need to stay focused on the rules and regulations which our medical community has provided. We cannot, and dare not, short cut their recommendations. We do not need to panic as we have been told. Common sense, and holding our FOCUS on the rule of the day is more important than many things which we have become accustomed to in our daily lives. Survival by doing what we have been asked to do is paramount; risks are foolish adventures not to be taken during this period of crisis. We need to be smart about our choices, exercising good judgement to avoid personal illness which may be transmitted to family members, friends, and other groups. Stay calm, stay home, and stay well. We all can follow these three simple steps.

During times like this, we can benefit from our personal time by reading, moving ahead with class work if that is on our schedule, by doing some spring cleaning in our room, in the house as well as the yard. Use this time to your mutual family benefit. Don't busy yourself with trying to rush around your city or community to engage with others. Give them a break—stay put. Rushing to shop at your favorite location isn't needed. Shop for the necessities that you and your family need. You don't need cases of toilet paper to hoard, nor do you need bottles and bottles of hand sanitizer. If you can't get hand sanitizer, use Dawn dishwashing soap, COVID-19 doesn't survive with this item. A recent visit to my local H.E.B. store showed how much panic people are exhibiting. Shopping carts pile high with lots of stuff and much of it not needed. Stay calm! At times like this, God's Love is still with us, so we don't need to be afraid or worrisome. Think about God's Love and FOCUS on staying well for the duration of this epidemic. It too will pass!

Mission Endowment Committee Quarterly Report



Your generosity touches hearts and changes lives! On February 9th, Christ the King celebrated it's first distributions from our Mission Endowment Fund: \$2000 to Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) and \$700 to Trinity Lutheran Campus Ministries in Kingsville. Signe Frederickson, Mission Funding Director, ELCA, gratefully accepted our gift on behalf of the YAGM program. Elizabeth Zimmermann, a former YAGM from Austin, spoke about her YAGM experience in Hungary, where she did mission work for a year. They both expressed their gratitude for our gift and how it will enable Sarah Weaver, a current YAGM, to continue her volunteer work and ministry in Senegal this year (<https://sarahinsenegal.travel.blog> for more info). Deacon John Dellis also shared his congratulations for CTK as we celebrate these first distributions from our mission fund. Bill Maddox, our mission committee chair also thanked Lee Bennett, Glen Anderson and Deacon John

Dellis for their leadership in the establishment of the fund and our current committee members for their service. We recognized Myrtle Boenig's generosity in leaving an estate gift that provided the bulk of the initial investment in the endowment fund in 2018. Bill also thanked the congregation for its generous support, as the fund continues to grow. Pastor Mike also thanked Bill and John for their leadership and guidance for the endowment committee in its initial year.

As of Jan 31, the balance in the endowment fund (invested in Endowment Fund A of the ELCA) is: \$86,502. (February balance was not yet available as of 3/14/20).

We want to welcome Johan (and Mirana) Rakotoniaina who will be joining the Mission Endowment Committee, and Bill Maddox for his leadership, as his committee term ends.

We continued to be blessed and thankful for the response from our congregation. We encourage your continued support of this new way that CTK can achieve it's mission to grow disciples for Christ.

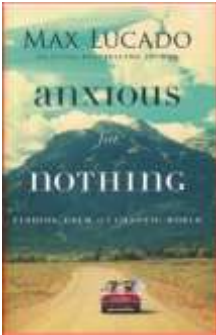
