WORSHIP CONTINUES TO EVOLVE

Thanks to everyone for your understanding as we have tried new and different things in regards to our worship services returning indoors.

For now, we will continue with the seating configurations that we have been using with the pulpit side having every row open and the organ side seating in every other row. We are doing this to allow for individual comfort levels regarding safety and health.

Beginning in July, we will no longer require the reservation system to attend worship! However, we will require everyone to sign in as you arrive for worship so that we have an accurate list of those present in case we need to make contact tracing efforts. In the event that someone alerts us that they have been exposed to Covid, we will simply alert everyone in attendance at worship on that Sunday.

Video Disclaimer: Since we are livestreaming worship, we want to also be sure everyone understands a new reality about the cameras. Our cameras DO NOT pan over the pews showing who is in attendance, but if you come forward you WILL be in view. So, if you prefer to not be on camera (the livestream and recorded service), keep this in mind.

Continuing measures:

We are still asking for everyone to wear masks while in the building if you are not fully vaccinated. If fully vaccinated, it is your choice to wear a mask or not.

We will also continue the use of the disposable communion kits, which can be picked up in the lobby when entering - along with a printed bulletin, as needed.

Additionally, we are still not singing during the music times (but invite you to continue humming lightly if you would like to do so).

Ushers will continue to dismiss from the back of the sanctuary AFTER the sending song.

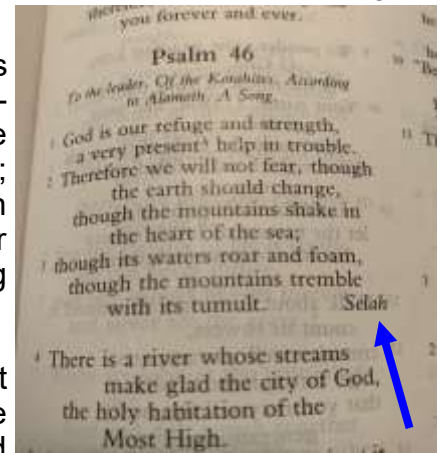




Have you noticed the word “Selah” in the Psalms when reading them in the Bible? It occurs seventy-one times in the Psalms (and three times in the book of Habakkuk). It is tucked in at various places;

sometimes at the end of a line and other times seemingly between paragraphs. In Wednesday morning Bible study, Mary Petermeier reminded me of this concept and I thought it was an interesting thought to share with y’all now. So, thanks Mary!!

Selah is a Hebrew word and we aren’t completely sure what it’s exact meaning is because selah is a transliteration. Most of the words in the original Hebrew and Greek manuscripts have English equivalents and can be translated. However, there are a handful of words in the Bible that do not have counterpart words in English (or were intentionally left untranslated/transliterated). A transliteration is when a word from one language is simply sounded out in another language so we can read and pronounce it. Hallelujah is an example since it is a transliteration of the Hebrew word that literally means “praise God” in English. Instead of being translated in our English bibles as “praise God”, the translators and editors have chosen to retain the original Hebrew word for us to sound out and as such it continues to be a powerful expression of praise (possibly even more so than if we were to use the English equivalent). Like hallelujah, selah is a transliteration that brings a different understanding to us now, but one that connects us with our ancestors in faith.



As you can guess, the question of its meaning has been debated for centuries. It has been interpreted as an instruction calling for a break in the singing of the psalm (remember the psalms are ancient hymns). Another thought is that it means “forever” and would be used in conjunction with Amen; like “Amen, selah!” or “Amen forever!”. While yet another suggested idea is that it means “to pause or to reflect”. Mary mentioned that someone told her it means “to pause and to praise”. All of these are great concepts and give us helpful ways to use this word when it comes to our reading of scripture and our faith practices.

Whenever you see “selah” in reading scripture, use it as a moment to stop reading and pause on the passage you just read. Reflect on its meaning for you at this time in your life. Or maybe, print up the word “selah” or a graphic with it and place it around your home or workspace. Then when you see it, take a moment to pause and reflect (on your day, your blessings, or even what you are doing at that moment) and then give praise to God.

We can all stand to have more moments of pausing and reflecting in our days. Hallelujah, selah! Praise God forever!

“Generous Giving Results in Joyous Living”

I recall that several years ago we were fortunate to have The Rev. Susan J. Briner, then Assistant to the Bishop in the Southwestern Texas Synod, and now Bishop, deliver the message. In her message, she twice included the statement that “Generous Giving Results in Joyous Living”.

When we talk about “generous giving”, we sometimes think the emphasis is primarily on the financial, or treasures, aspect of our stewardship. **But we need to remember that the offering plate is but only one of many ways to fulfill our commitment to the work of our Lord.** As we have mentioned on several occasions, we are blessed to have over 40 activities in which members share their time and talents. Many serve in more than one capacity, and when included in each activity they serve, the total is an astounding 500+. Is this generous giving? Amen! Does this result in joyous living? You bet!

Let us remember that we all have the opportunity and responsibility to share our time, talents, and treasures in living our life as stewards of what God has entrusted to us. Sometimes we may feel that we are not able, or do not feel qualified to serve, but remember, as Paul states in Romans 12:6-8, “We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith; if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully.” To paraphrase, we can all serve as God has blessed us.

However, we sometimes feel that, for various reasons, we cannot serve. Even great and faithful leaders have had doubts. Consider Moses for example. He said:

I am not important enough. But every Christian should be humble. But it is bad to have no sense of our worth. That is not being humble.

I do not know what to say because I lack the necessary qualities.

They will not listen to me. Moses was full of doubts. He told God that if he did God’s work it would not be successful. It is the same for us too. Doubts will stop of us from being successful in our service for God.

I am not a good speaker. Moses continues with one excuse after another. He told God “You can find someone better than me.”

Please send someone else. Moses said that he knew someone must do the work, and he told God, “You can find someone better than me”.

God gave Moses a challenge and asked him to serve. But Moses still had all these excuses. However, Moses listened, served, and set an example for us. We too, as believers, can serve.

Let us remain focused on our objective, and not let insignificant things hinder or change our progress. I am reminded of a cartoon where the setting was Moses parting the waters of the Red Sea and the Israelites were walking through on dry land. All of a sudden, the entire procession stopped. Moses, being the great leader and faithful servant of God, asked “Why have you stopped?” A woman shouted hysterically, “Oh my, I think I stepped on a fish”. Let’s not let the insignificant things get in the way of our continuing progress.

Remember, as emphasized by Pastor (Bishop) Briner, that *“generous giving results in joyous living”*. By so doing, we will continue to serve neighbors near and far, and grow disciples for Christ.

DEEP IN OUR HEARTS (Memorial to lives lost due to Covid)

The Deep in Our Hearts COVID-19 Memorial is located at the corner of E. Market and S. Alamo Streets in downtown San Antonio, (3 blocks south of the Alamo; directly west of the Convention Center; directly north of HemisFair). As of the end of April 2021, almost 3,500 San Antonians have been lost during the pandemic due to COVID-19. PROPOSED COUNCIL STRUCTURE CHANGE

C12.01.01 of our constitution reads: There shall be a Ministry Group for each of eight congregational functions with Congregation Council members as chairpersons as follows: Education, Evangelism, Fellowship, Finance, Outreach, Property/Grounds, Worship, and Mutual Ministry.

During the past several years Evangelism and Outreach have been doing many of the same activities with the same people. After reviewing this situation along with other considerations, the council has proposed seven congregational functions (aka committees) along with the council president.

The proposed structure would combine Evangelism with Outreach and establish a Shepherding Ministry with two sub-elements, Outreach and Care.

Proposed changes to section C12.01.01 (changes underlined): There shall be a Ministry Team for each of seven congregational ministries with Congregation Council members as chairpersons as follows: Education, Fellowship, Finance, Property/Grounds, Shepherding, Worship, and Mutual Ministry.

Why a Care ministry? Before COVID-19, less than half, 31%, of practicing Christians in the United States felt strongly connected to and included in their worshipping communities. A well-connected community needs an avenue to develop intentional relationships that share life together. Our vision statement calls us to shepherd for life, therefore the Shepherding Ministry. A care ministry would be a tool to creatively and intentionally reach out and connect with all those within our community. This ministry would work hand in hand with other groups such as WELCA's prayer shawl ministry.



Interestingly, the SWT Synod has had a Conference Care Connector with a lay person as a Congregational Care Connector in each congregation. "The Office of the Bishop aims to promote healthy and strong relationships within each conference and across the synod in order to connect congregations to resources when they are in need or to neighbors when they have gifts to share."

Outreach ministry has an outward focus – connecting with those outside our worshipping community e.g., working with schools, other churches, city organizations; hosting community events such as National Night Out, trunk or treat, etc.; and contacting visitors (to our worship services) who live in the local area.

For clarification, Fellowship ministry is group-focused and provides opportunities to gather together to share experiences and celebrations. This will continue in the new proposed structure under the "Care" component of the Shepherding Team.



In our dismissal, we are told to "go in peace to love and serve the Lord" and we respond "Thanks be to God! And we will!"

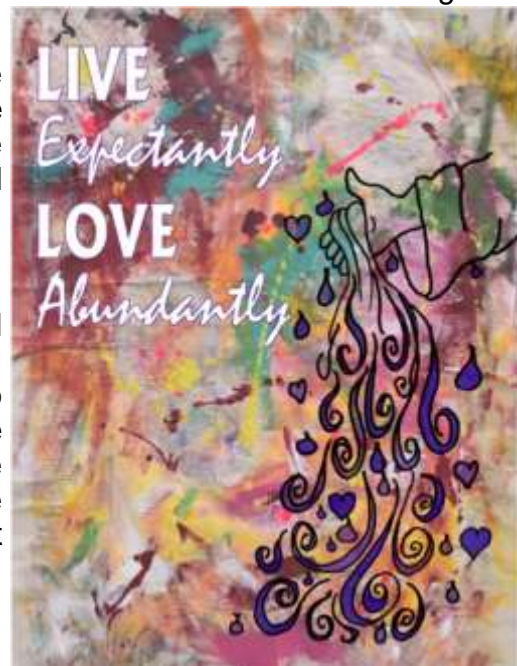

SYNOD ASSEMBLY

We don't have it yet, but we will be sharing a summary of the Synod Assembly. The theme was "Live Expectantly, Love Abundantly" and was focused on the Samaritan woman at the well. You are invited to read the story (John 4:7-42) and spend some time reflecting on this image.

SYNOD ASSEMBLY OFFERING

While our synod assembly occurred in early June, we are still able to make donations for the assembly offering. The Synod Council designated our offerings this year to be given to two ministries - AMMPARO and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (LIRS). More information about both of these can be found below and on page 11. Please consider helping these ministries by making a donation, but be sure to notate your gift is for "Synod Assembly Offering" in the memo or in some way.



What is AMMPARO?

AMMPARO is the ELCA strategy to accompany children and families today and in the future who are forced to flee their communities. This strategy was adopted by the ELCA Churchwide Assembly in August, 2016.

Our commitments are to: 1) uphold and guarantee basic the human rights and safety of migrant children and their families; 2) address the root causes of migration in countries from Central America's Northern Triangle and Mexico and the treatment of migrants in transit; 3) work toward just and humane policies affecting migrants in and outside the U.S.; and 4) engage as a church body with all of its companions, affiliates and partners to respond to the migration situation as a whole context and to advocate for migrant children and their families.

How are funds allocated?

Important work in countries of origin, Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala assisting deported children and youth to find encounters. Additional funding supports work throughout Latin America for advocacy for migrants and humanitarian assistance to people fleeing countries of origin in several countries. 70% of AMMPARO funds support this work. Our companions work with children and youth deported from the US and Mexico to make sure they have a safe place to live, a way to generate income and psycho-social trauma counseling. Our companions report an 88%-95% success rate. To see a video, go to www.elca.org/ammparo. The video is entitled AMMPARO Impact.

In the US, AMMPARO funds legal services for unaccompanied children and supports our congregations who provide shelter to families released from ICE custody. International advocacy takes place in our ELCA Advocacy office and around the country to protect migrant children and families.

INTRODUCTION

For 80 years, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service has been a champion for immigrants and refugees from around the globe. In partnership with community-based legal and social service providers nationwide, LIRS has helped over half a million immigrants and refugees rebuild their lives in America. Our programs largely fall into one of two categories: Children and Family Services and Refugee and Migrant Services.

- Community Engagement—Leveraging a nationwide network of service partners and congregations, LIRS equips communities to walk alongside and support their new neighbors.
